Re: USMLE Notification of Invalidated Exam Scores and its implication on Nepalese Medical Graduates pursuing career in the USA and currently practicing physicians in USA

Dear Sir/ Madam,

We are deeply concerned by the statement released by USMLE on Jan 31, 2024 regarding the above. We agree with you that it's extremely important to ensure appropriate steps are taken to uphold the integrity of the exam. We also agree that those who did wrong should be held accountable. However, we are concerned about naming and involving the entire nation of Nepal in the statement. We think this will tarnish the image of the country as a whole and will open an avenue for innocent applicants from the country to be victimized for years to come. This also creates undue psychological impact among thousands of licensed excellent practicing physicians in the US from Nepal who serve day and night to provide the best healthcare possible.

The implications extend beyond just the applicants; this will affect practicing physicians (in thousands currently) and their patients, many of whom have developed strong bonds and relationships built on trust and mutual respect. The potential long-term repercussions could significantly undermine the contributions of Nepali physicians to healthcare system in the USA and overall trust to healthcare system in general.

America Nepal Medical Foundation (ANMF) asks USMLE secretariat to revise or retract the statement immediately so that is not defamatory towards one country as the statement published on Jan 31, 2024 fosters an environment of collective discrimination, humiliation and punishment from any Nepali applicant. This can leave lasting negative impact towards the entire Nepali community here in the USA into future applicant cycles.

ANMF urges USMLE that those under review must be given due process and those who are not under investigations must not be barred from fair chances of being ranked and matched in the program.
